The word "certificate" has multiple meanings according to the Merriam-Webster dictionary. Here are a few:

- a document containing a certified statement especially as to the truth of something

Our November 15th meeting, last month, got me thinking about certificates. I have received many certs over my lifetime. The first one I received I don't even remember getting. In fact, it required zero effort on my part. It was my Birth Certificate. Although I wasn't involved in acquiring it, I've had to produce it when applying for a SSN card, my first driver's license, and a passport, among other things.

I believe my next cert came along when I was nine. Unlike my Birth certificate I had to put a little effort into this one. It was my Certificate of Baptism and I had to memorize some things as part of the process. HALLOWEEN

Our Halloween Parade was scheduled for the Oct. 29th but mother nature had other plans which led to the event being cancelled. If you visit our website (www.piquakiwanis.org) and click on **About**, you will discover that our annual Halloween parade first started back in 1956. That's sixty-nine years ago!

1956 seems like a long time ago. I was only three back then. But in relation to the history Halloween, sixty-nine years is nothing. Halloween is the night before, or the "eve" of, All Saints Day. According to the Oxford University Press, All Saints Day was referred to as All Hallows Day as early as 1225, making the night before "All Hallows Eve". All Hallows Eve became Allhallowe'en around 1550 then changed to Hallowe'en in 1745. In 1786 the apostrophe was dropped, resulting in Halloween.

Why Halloween falls on October 31 goes back even further. Ancient civilizations had been honoring their dead through pagan festivals for thousands of years. Then along came Christianity, and in the 8th century Pope Gregory III dedicated an oratory in the original St. Peter's Basilica in honor of all the saints on November 1 (according to most accounts). Thus, the official date for the feast of All Saints (now All Saints Day) became November 1, making October 31 the eve of All Saints Day, or Halloween.

Most sources agree that Halloween's roots go back over 2000 years to an ancient Celtic festival called Samhain, which fell on November 1. Samhain celebrated the end of summer and the harvest, and the beginning of winter. They believed that spirits could move in and out of the living world during that time, so the Celts would light bonfires and set out food hoping to win the favor of the spirits. They also disguised themselves to avoid being recognized by ghosts of those who had died the previous year. By the 7th century, the Church began to replace pagan festivals with religious observances. Samhain was eventually absorbed into All Saints Day, but Samhain is still celebrated today by modern pagans on October 31.

European immigrants brought Halloween to the United States in the 1800s, but trick-or-treating didn't become widespread until after WWII. That's when rationing ended, candy was readily available, and suburban neighborhoods developed which made it easier for kids to travel from house to house for a treat.

What about candy? Americans spent over \$3 billion on Halloween candy in 2024. According to the Cincinnati Inquirer (and other sources) blow pops and M&Ms are the most popular Halloween candies in OH, with blow pops leading the way. FYI: OH was the only state to report blow pops as their most popular Halloween candy!

EARLY BIRD SPECIAL

The official date for Halloween is October 31. Page 6 lays out the history of holiday and why it falls on the 31st. But what's a number? Page 6 also mentions that we attempted to have our Halloween parade the 29th and not the 31st. Then the city of Piqua declared Oct 30 as trick or treat night for this year. So there you go. Apparently selecting a date for Halloween is like playing horseshoes; close is good enough!

This year the Piqua Center really got an early start. They hosted a "trick or treat" night at the mall on October 20th! That's what you call an early bird special. The early date didn't hold anyone back. Over 700 trick or treaters attended, included a few Piqua Kiwanians and their families. Builders Club and the Key Club were also on hand manning their own tables and handing out candy.
